

1 Basics of Unemployment Insurance (UI) Law in Washington State

This session will review the overall intent of UI statutes and rules, employer and worker as adversaries, basic monetary eligibility for benefits (work history), the central importance of the job separation (discharge, voluntary quit, or layoff) in eligibility for benefits, plus other requirements, including availability to work and job search, the roles of alleged misconduct and good cause for quitting in establishing eligibility, and levels of appeal.

2 The Appeals Process: Preparing and Representing a UI Claimant at Hearing

In this session, the presenter will discuss notices of hearing, exhibit files, and case notes, prehearing conferences with the client, establishing good cause for nonappearance or missed deadlines, possible third-party representatives, direct and re-direct examination, cross examination, objections, treatment of hearsay, closing arguments, receiving decisions, filing further appeals, and pro bono representation.
